


A Powerful Message

Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Joe Sawyer sent a powerful letter to the Shrewsbury school community saying "we need to do more and we need to do better" in response to the killing of George Floyd and "the crisis our nation is experiencing."



"There are many things that we already do in our schools to teach our students about racism...But as a school community...we need to do more and we need to do better..."

"It is my hope that in our schools our students will not only learn about the history of racism and understand its impact on our society, but that they will also develop the character and will to do what is right, both now and when they become adults. It is my hope that whatever their future roles may be. . . they act in ways that create a more equitable society for everyone, one that lives up to our American aspirations for liberty and justice for all."

Dr. Sawyer concluded his message by saying "I hope that together, we will find the wisdom - and the will - to do what is right."
