As COVID 19 cases surged in the US, we adjusted to our new normal: staying home, wearing masks, learning Zoom, searching fruitlessly for hand sanitizer and toilet paper.


Remote Learning and Special Education Survey

Following the remote learning survey the District sent out half way through the fall term, we created a 14 question survey asking families about their experiences with Special Education and remote learning. We sent the survey to our 240 email contacts and posted it to our Facebook page. 31 families completed the anonymous survey and we shared the results with Meg and Dr. Sawyer. The results were largely positive with approximately 40% of respondents satisfied and 20% highly satisfied with the way special education services and supports were being delivered. The survey also allowed space for comments about how the delivery of services and supports could be improved.



Also for contracting with Interface, a referral service for mental health providers. Interface uses referral counselors to help families navigate the challenges of finding mental health services, which is difficult for everyone.



Commitment to Diversity, Equity and Inclusion

First, by commissioning an Equity Audit and then by laying the groundwork for this vital work to grow, through expanded hiring practices to increase diversity, professional development activities, and reviewing and improving anti-racist educational practices.
