

What is a SEPAC?

- Every public school district in Massachusetts is required to establish a SEPAC. Massachusetts state law assigns both an advisory and participatory function to SEPACs. Membership is open to district parents of children with disabilities and other interested parties.
- Duties shall include, but not be limited to:
 - advising the School Committee on matters that pertain to the education and safety of students with disabilities;
 - meeting regularly with school officials to participate in the planning, development and evaluation of the district's special education programs; and
 - cooperating with the District on their annual workshop on the rights of students, parents and guardians under state and federal law.
- The SEPAC is a self-governing public body which creates its own by-laws and operational procedures. A SEPAC is different from other parent groups in a school district such as a PTA, PTO or School Council a SEPAC does not represent families from one school, but represents all families of children with disabilities from the entire school district.

Textile Collection Fundraiser

- October 2022 in partnership with the Epilepsy Foundation
- Held at Sherwood Middle School
- Facilitated pickups of donations in the weeks leading up to the event
- Very successful, collected 2927 pounds which provided funding for two presentations that we offered later in the year

- 85 registrants, approximately 20-25 from Shrewsbury

- Big takeaway: "Accommodation over Remediation"




Photo Shoot Fundraiser

- December 2022 in partnership with the Federation for Children with Special Needs (FCSN)
- This is a free workshop that meets the district requirement and provides families with information about their rights
- Well-attended and very informative

Collaborative Problem Solving Workshop

- February 2023 in partnership with Northborough/Southborough and Nashoba SEPACs and presented by Karen Kraut
- 81 registrants, approximately 20 from Shrewsbury
- What is Collaborative Problem Solving? (source: thinkkids.org)
 - "Kids with challenging behavior are tragically misunderstood and mistreated. Rewards and punishments don't work and often make things worse. Thankfully, there's another way. But it requires a big shift in mindset.
 - Helping kids with challenging behavior requires understanding why they struggle in the first place. Our Collaborative Problem Solving approach recognizes what research has pointed to for years that kids with challenging behavior are already trying hard. They don't lack the *will* to behave well. They lack the *skills* to behave well."



ADHD Essentials Presentation

- March 2023 in partnership with Northborough/Southborough and Nashoba SEPACs, presented by Brendan Mahan
- 210 registrants, approximately 25 from Shrewsbury
- Very popular and well-received presentation which included information about the role of executive function, the emotional impact of ADHD and practical strategies for home and school





Coffee & Connect

- Our Coffee & Connect events were popular this year, and a great way to connect in person and support one another
- Average attendance was approximately 6 people
- Many supportive and productive conversations were had, relationships formed and there is continued interest in offering these
