

Ten Keys to an Effective School Council

- 1. School council members act as <u>advisors</u> to the principal.
- 2. Members <u>work together</u> to identify the needs of students and make recommendations to increase student performance.
- 3. They <u>ask questions</u>, <u>provide important feedback</u>, <u>and consider ways to solve problems</u>.
- 4. A major function of school councils is the development of the <u>school</u> <u>improvement plan</u>, which addresses these areas:
 - curriculum/instruction/ assessment
 - professional development for staff
 - respectful community
 - school space
- 5. Members provide information and make suggestions. They <u>seek to understand</u> the viewpoints of all council members, and through this process, council members gain an increased understanding of the school, its strengths, needs, and goals.
- 6. Council members seek to reach <u>consensus</u> about school needs and plans for improvement.
- 7. A school council's goals should be <u>consistent with the goals</u> established by the district's School Committee.
- 8. Members regularly engage in <u>two-way communication</u> with the populations they represent.
- 9. Council members take their <u>responsibilities seriously</u> by attending and participating in meetings.
- 10. The council's focus remains on the needs of the school and its students, not personal issues. Those are best addressed in a more private forum.
