

# MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

# SHREWSBURY HIGH SCHOOL STADIUM SCOREBOARD LOGO PLACEMENT

### I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this Memorandum of Understanding [MOU] is to set forth the terms and conditions for the conveyance of top corporate logo placement on the Shrewsbury High School Stadium Scoreboard [Stadium Scoreboard], located at 64 Holden Street, Shrewsbury, Massachusetts pursuant to M.G.L. c.44 S. 53A;

by the Shrewsbury Public Schools School Committee [the Committee],

to Al's Oil Service currently located at 307 Hartford Turnpike Shrewsbury, MA.

# II. TERMS AND CONDITIONS

In accordance with School Committee Policy 912 and in exchange for Al's Oil Service sponsorship donation of \$100,000, and subject to the conditions herein, the Committee agrees to situate the Al's Oil Service corporate logo as the top/most prominent sponsorship logo on the stadium scoreboard for as long as there is a stadium scoreboard at this location and the corporation, as currently named, remains an ongoing entity.

# III. RIGHTS AND AUTHORITY OF SHREWSBURY PUBLIC SCHOOLS

By entering into this MOU, the Committee retains singular authority, control, and rights of use of the Stadium Scoreboard, and all property and activities at Shrewsbury High School as provided by statute, federal, state or local regulation, local Town Charter or by-law or requirement of the MIAA or other regulatory body.

The Committee reserves its right to confer other naming rights to other donors on the athletic complex, the stadium field itself, and other corporate logo rights on the scoreboard.

The Committee also reserves its right to rescind these logo rights in the unlikely event that Al's Oil Service dissolves or is found to have committed any criminal, discriminatory, or other act deemed by the Committee to warrant such removal. In the event of a corporate sale to a new owner, the scoreboard logo rights will pass to the new owner only if the corporate name is retained as "Al's Oil Service".

# IV. CONVEYANCE OF SPONSORSHIP PAYMENTS

Al's Oil Service agrees to provide to the Shrewsbury Public Schools a payment in the amount of \$100,000 by May 16, 2018. Said payment may be made in cash or stock or bond transfer and will be considered a donation to the Shrewsbury High School Artificial Turf Field Project Fund and used strictly for the purpose of construction and installation of such a field on the current stadium location and related activities, and shall be governed by the provisions of M.G.L. c.44 S. 53A. Any interest on said payment shall remain with and become a part of the funds so provided and may be expended as part of the Shrewsbury High School Artificial Turf Field Project.

# V. EFFECTIVE DATE AND SIGNATURE

This MOU shall be effective upon the affirmative vote of the School Committee of the Shrewsbury
Public Schools as verified by their respective duly authorized representative below and agreement
by Edward Flynn.

A. SHS Transitions Program: Report

The aim of the program is to provide support to students returning to school from an extended absence due to hospitalization or treatment for mental health issues, concussion, substance abuse treatment, etc. A report on the program's implementation will be provided by the two educators who staff the program: Susan Donofrio, the Clinican/Program Leader, and Kelli McSweeney, the Academic Coordinator. # **BRYT: BRIDGE FOR RESILIENT YOUTH IN TRANSITION**

Partnering with schools and families to get teens back on track after prolonged absences. Each BRYT program approaches <u>staffing</u>, <u>space</u>, <u>and services</u> with a consistent vision, while customizing the specifics for each school population and for each student.

# THE BRYT NETWORK

Dating back to the establishment of the original BRYT Program in 2004 at Brookline High School, the rapidly-growing BRYT Network now includes 80 Massachusetts schools collectively enrolling 88,000 students.

# Who do we serve?

- \*\*Students returning to school after missing 5 or more consecutive absences due to psychiatric hospitalization or participation in another mental health/intervention program.
- \*\*Students returning to school after missing 5 or more consecutive days of school due to a
  medical crisis, (e.g., concussion) who have been identified as needing focused social/emotional
  support and academic case management.
- Additionally, students may be reviewed to attend the Transition program who may not be
  hospitalized, but have been unable to attend school/function in school for at least 5 days
  due to a serious mental health challenge.

\*\*61% of our students 2017-18 school year were re-entry

39% were referred as a preventative measure.

Referred by: School Counselors, Psychologists, Nursing, or Grade Administrator. All referrals and eligibility discussed at Student Support Team meetings.





# 2017-18 (Year 1) SHS Transitions Program Data


- 51 students total have used the program thus far in the school year.
- 35% referred for concussions
- 24% referred for medical (surgery, illness)
- 41% referred for mental health
- In the 2017-18 school year, **26** students have sought mental health evaluation or treatment including use of ED, EMH, substance abuse treatment, partial hospitalization or inpatient hospitalization.







# Case Study: Student Progress through SHS Transitions






# **Child and Adolescent Functional Assessment Scale (CAFAS)**

This rating scale of student functioning is conducted at intake and exit. For this student intake was completed on 3/6/18 and exit assessment was conducted on 5/4/18.

A score of 30 is considered severe impairment in that area of functioning. Lower scores indicate better functioning; all differences are statistically significant.

# SHS Transitions Program Exit Criteria:

The decision as to when a student moves from "active" to "alumni" status in the program is made by the program staff, student and parent(s)/guardian(s), and school support staff as a team. This team shares the understanding that is a short-term, transitional program aimed at supporting students in successfully returning to their full schedule. The team will look at the indicators below to help determine when a student is ready to exit the program.

- Observable improvements and stability in moods and emotions, school functioning, and (where applicable) self-harming behaviors/ideation and substance abuse.
- Mainstream classroom attendance (80% or better is a good indicator of readiness)
- No recent re-hospitalization.
- Completion of academic assignments (80% completion of assignments missed while in treatment, and completion of work required for receiving term grades, are good indicators of readiness).

# **School Committee Security and Safety Update 2018**

# Stephen Rocco Coordinator, Security & Transportation

During this past fiscal year, a continued and ongoing comprehensive top down review and analysis was conducted of the School Department's safety and security procedures with an overall goal of enhancing and strengthening the district's overall security posture.

Our goal each and every year is to continue improving and refining our security procedures to meet the challenges of ever evolving threats. The actions taken in the initial minutes of an emergency are critical to saving lives. Details are as follows.

Standard Response Protocols (SRP): SRPs have been fully integrated and deployed throughout the school district at each and every school site location with continuous and varied training involving emergency response base scenarios. The training and associated drills have continued to evolve in complexity and scope (i.e. unannounced drills to both staff and students, Lock Down drills while students are outside the building or classrooms, blocked pathways in order to alter routes and stimulate critical thinking during a fire drill, and incorporating severe weather scenarios in addition to continuous ongoing active shooter and fire drills). Site surveys to identify "safe zones" and subsequent shelter drills were conducted at Parker Road, Floral, Paton, Sherwood, and Oak schools, with the assistance of school administrators.

**Emergency Radio Communications:** Emergency hand held radio and base stations with their own dedicated frequency have been installed and in use at each school site location. These radios are monitored by police dispatch at all times. This allows the schools direct contact with the Police Department in case of an emergency. It also allows for redundancy for emergency contact by schools in case the telephones were disabled. Training for utilization has been provided to school staff

and routine testing is conducted to ensure operability.

**Two-way radios:** Standardized two-way radios have been deployed to all school site locations throughout the district. Staff have been full trained on their use and are proficient in utilizing them. These VHF model radio options allow for the police department personnel the option to "dial" in to the school's respective radio frequency and effectively communicate directly with staff members during an emergency situation. Standardization of radio and communication equipment is an essential element of an effective communication plan.

Emergency Management Table Top Exercises (TTXs): Tabletop Exercises (TTXs) generally involve key personnel discussing simulated scenarios in an informal setting. This type of exercise can be used to assess plans, policies, and procedures or to assess the protocols and systems needed to guide the prevention of, response to, and recovery from a defined incident. Participants are encouraged to discuss issues in depth and to develop decisions through slow-paced problem solving, rather than the rapid, spontaneous decision making that occurs under actual or simulated emergency conditions. The effectiveness of a TTX is derived from the energetic involvement of participants and their assessment of recommended revisions to current policies, procedures, and plans.

During the past year, the School Department in conjunction Shrewsbury Police Department conducted twelve (12) separate TTXs. Of the twelve TTX's, the first two involved large-scale emergency management scenarios centered around discussing and developing Parent-Student Reunification protocols with senior staff and representatives of each school's Crisis Management Team. The third large scale TTX was an Active Shooter scenario at the High School focused on implementing developed Parent-Student Reunification protocols and procedures.

Subsequently, a total of nine (9) additional Parent-Student TTX's were conducted with SPD at each school site with Staff and Crisis Management Team members. Protocols and Procedures were established to address certain nuisances specific to a certain school site.

Evacuation sites were reviewed and updated which gives the school department greater access and control.

Building Assessment Team (BAT) Security Survey: A major goal of the BAT is to provide enhanced protection for students and staff by pinpointing high-risk areas in school buildings where potential problems or emergency situations might occur. The BAT is conducted on a yearly basis and is comprised of members from the School Department, Shrewsbury Police Department, Shrewsbury Fire Department, and Town Buildings Department. This may also be known as Target hardening. Target hardening refers to strengthening the security of a building and in this case the various schools, so that it is difficult for an individual(s) to attack. The goal is to increase the time and effort (creating a "Time Barrier") needed to compromise a school facility to the point where a perpetrator will move on to a softer target. The BAT accomplishes this through a "Physical Security Survey" and walk through of each school site location. The survey is an annual comprehensive, detailed, technical on-site inspection and analysis of the current security and physical protection conditions. As a result, numerous improvements were implemented to include the following sampling:

- -Installed new and improved Public-Address Systems located at Paton, Parker Road, and Coolidge schools.
- -Identified and conducted drilling sessions for students and staff relocating into "Safe Zones" for severe weather/tornado sheltering within the following schools sites: Floral, Parker Road, Coolidge, Paton, Spring, and Sherwood.
- -Provided Magnet Door Locks to numerous school locations in order to expedite the securing of classrooms during an emergency situation.
- -Identified and anticipate the installation of new and improved Public Address System for Spring St School. Existing system is old and failing.

**Training:** The School Department in conjunction with the Shrewsbury Police Department during December and April 2017-18 conducted Active Shooter Training and classroom instruction at the Sherwood and Oak Middle Schools during winter and spring school breaks. Because there is no way of knowing which police department employees might be the first to arrive at the scene of an active shooter event, the thought process behind the training was to train all officers in the skills that would be needed to perform critical tasks. These skills and tasks include immediate assessment of an active shooter scene, room entry techniques, building clearing, building formularization and victim rescue. Active shooter incidents are fundamentally different from hostage situations and other critical incidents, because of the extreme pressure on police to respond as quickly as possible to stop the killing and wounding of victims. Active shooter training is built around the reality that even a one-minute delay in responding may result in multiple additional fatalities.

Additional training and drills pertaining to other emergency type scenarios were conducted to include Lockout, Shelter, Evacuation, and Fire.

The Future of Security and Safety in the School Department: Again, with our eyes focused forward the School Department through the year will continue to build upon, improve and refine our security and safety procedures to meet the challenges of ever evolving threats. Standardization and institutionalizing our emergency response protocols, communications and equipment, along with training will remain the cornerstones of this program. The School Department will maintain our vigilance and evolve our procedures to counter the everincreasing bomb threats, which continue to plague numerous school districts. Enhancement and leveraging technology surrounding the existing school video surveillance systems and capabilities is critical for several reasons. School security cameras help maintain safety around our campus, they also discourage misbehavior, and act as a deterrent. Conspicuously placed school surveillance cameras have been shown to reduce threats of violence and vandalism drastically. Additionally, school security cameras at entrance doors can assist administrative staff in the monitoring of visitors and ensure they are properly signed in,

while still allowing students and staff to move freely around the campus.

Lastly and most importantly, continue to work with school administrators in support of a robust High School Student Support Team (SST), which consists of school administrators, guidance counselors, psychologists, and students to help proactively prevent violence and or inappropriate behavior in the schools. The efforts of the SST, which meets on a weekly basis, can go a long way toward mitigating the threat of such occurrences. Although not an exact science for predicting school setting violence or adverse behavior, students and staff can take certain actions to reduce these incidents. First, it is critical to understand that these types of behavior do not just happen at random or "out of the blue." Rather, perpetrators usually display some behaviors of concern. Thus, awareness of these indicators and the subsequent implementation of an action plan to de-escalate potentially violent situations and/or unwanted behavioral issues form essential components of school violence prevention program. As a side note, this program through its proactive efforts was credited with identifying and successfully resolving a recent potential threat posed to the High School.

# School Safety and Security Goals and Objectives

- Every year the goal is to enhance and strengthen the school district's overall security posture
- Adapt and improve upon emergency SRPs to identify and neutralize emerging threats (manmade or natural)
- Continue training and drills with increased complexity and challenges
- Continue to leverage technology-video surveillance cameras and communications equipment

# School Video Surveillance Camera (VSC) System

- Fully installed and integrated IP VSC system throughout the district
- 24/7 camera access through Local Area Network (LAN) via ExacQvision software for designated personnel
- Both PD/FD dispatch centers have the ability to access and monitor school site locations
- Significantly improves overall security operations at the respective school sites
- Archived high resolution video can easily be searched by date & location
- Assures staff, students, teachers, and parents appropriate measures are in place to ensure their safety

# Standard Response Protocols (SRP)

- Fully ingrained and proficient emergency SRPs deployed throughout the school district
- Continuous training and associated drills with increased complexity and scope (i.e. unannounced fire/active shooter, evacuation with "obstructed" exit ways.
- Identified school "safe zones" for severe weather situations (i.e. Tornado)

# Emergency Management Table Top Exercises (TTXs)

- Simulated emergency response scenarios in an informal, non-stressful setting
- Used to assess emergency management plans, protocols, and systems (SRP)
- Two District wide sponsored Parent-Student Reunification TTXs conducted this year with Shrewsbury PD/FD and Town Department Heads (Additionally Conducted joint School/SPD Reunification TTXs (total of 9) with each school's Crisis Management Team)
- Continue the conduct of TTXs in the future

## **Building Assessment Team (BAT)**

- Comprised of School Department, Police, Fire, and Building Facilities representatives
- Continue identifying and improving high-risk areas in school buildings where potential problems or emergency situations might occur
- Continue-"target hardening"-strengthening overall security posture of a specific school location (i.e. upgraded PA systems (3) this past year at Paton, Parker Road, and Coolidge schools-Spring St. this year
- Annual report generated with findings and recommendations for corrective action

## **Training**

 Continual tactical training with first responders (Active Shooter-various and rotating school locations)

 Continued emergency response training and drills at each school site through the year (Lockout, Lockdown, Shelter, Evacuation, Reunification)







The meeting was convened by Dr. Sawyer at 7:00 pm in advance of the election of officers.

#### I. Election of Officers

Dr. Sawyer requested and accepted nominations for the Chairperson of the School Committee. Ms. Canzano nominated Mr. Palitsch for Chairperson, and Dr. Magee seconded the motion. The Committee voted unanimously to appoint Mr. Palitsch Chairperson of the Committee. As the elected Chairperson of the School Committee, Mr. Palitsch requested nominations for the position of Vice Chairperson; Ms. Fryc nominated Ms. Canzano and Dr. Magee seconded the motion. The Committee voted unanimously to appoint Ms. Canzano Vice Chairperson. Mr. Palitsch requested nominations for the position of Secretary; Mr. Wensky nominated Ms. Fryc and Dr. Magee seconded the motion. The Committee voted unanimously to appoint Ms. Fryc Secretary.

#### **II. Public Participation**

Shrewsbury resident Bryan Moss addressed the Committee and advocated for the installation of two organically maintained natural grass fields instead of one synthetic turf field to meet demand for extended playing opportunities. Mr. Moss did not provide written materials to the Committee.

#### III. Chairperson's Report & Members' Reports

Mr. Palitsch reported that he attended the Shrewsbury Public Schools Elementary & Middle School Art Festival at Sherwood Middle School and commended the students and teachers for the excellent artwork.

#### IV. Superintendent's Report

Ms. Clouter attended a presentation of student passion projects (long-term, technology-based class projects) by students who are part of the SHS Student Innovation Team, and she acknowledged the efforts

of Shrewsbury High School (SHS) teacher Jason Andreola and ITAMS Director Shawna Powers in overseeing the projects.

Dr. Sawyer read a biography of each student, and then they had an opportunity to make brief remarks. They were invited to be recognized by the Committee and Administration and to receive a gift, and were also recognized by, and received a letter from, State Rep. Hannah Kane.

#### **B. SHS Student Advisory Committee: Report**

Benjamin George, Student, Class of 2018, Student Advisory Committee (SAC) Chair; Maya McCollum, Student, Class of 2018; Erica Hanlon, Student, Class of 2019; Paulina Hruskoci, Student, Class of 2019; and Prisha Singh, Student, Class of 2019, gave a report that included information on events, student accomplishments, and continuing conversations at SHS. In response to questions from the Committee,

they provided additional information on differences between Chinese and SHS classrooms, the Reality Check fair, and the newly formed Student Wellness Ambassador Team (SWAT) that will help students manage stress. Senior members discussed their future plans. Dr. Sawyer thanked the Committee for their work and noted that SAC provides an important voice for the SHS student community. The SAC members were invited up to be recognized by the Committee.

#### C. State Rep. Hannah Kane: Annual Legislative Report

State Rep. Hannah Kane began her annual report to the Committee by acknowledging a wide variety of accomplishments of SPS students in aggregate, as well as in smaller groups and teams. Rep. Kane provided a summary of her work on multiple committees, described pending legislation on a variety of issues, and noted past and upcoming events being sponsored by her office for the benefit of students and the greater community. Rep. Kane discussed the current House Budget - noting revenue expectations, taxes already collected, and uncertainty around the potential impact of upcoming ballot questions; Circuit Breaker reimbursement; non-resident pupil transportation issues; the status of a pending civic education bill; and noted that the Glavin Bill (the Glavin site is the Beal Building Committee's preferred site for a proposed new K-Grade 4 school) was a priority for her office.

In response to clarifying questions, Rep. Kane addressed concerns regarding the need for additional vocational opportunities for students (noting a corresponding need for affordable housing in MA), and the potential ways to use revenue generated by passage of a proposed "millionaires' tax" in the state. The Committee and Dr. Sawyer thanked Rep. Kane for her hard work and advocacy on behalf of students on a variety of issues, including Circuit Breaker reimbursement.

## D. Presentation & Public Hearing re: Town Meeting Warrant Article to Ban Polystyrene & Potential Impact on School Department

Mr. Collins and Beth Nichols, Food Service Director, gave a presentation on the potential impact that passage of a warrant article prohibiting the dispensing of prepared food in disposable food service containers made from Expanded Polystyrene would have on Shrewsbury Public Schools. Their presentation included information on the food service program at SPS, current disposal of waste and use of EPS styrofoam at SPS, and possible alternatives if the ban passes, noting that any increased costs would be borne by consumers. In discussion with the Committee it was noted this is a complex and town-wide issue, that the Food Service Department is self-funded, and that there are implications around food options and materials storage relative to the temperature-sensitive nature of some proposed alternative products.

Next, citizen petitioner Ramesh Razdan and SPS students Rahul Razdan, Siddanth Doshi, Anirudh Iyer, and Anish Warty, gave a presentation on their article that included information on: problems associated with styrofoam use and disposal methods and its impact on animals and the environment; MA towns that have banned EPS styrofoam; alternative products; anticipated results; survey data from local businesses; and the impact of the ban to schools. The Committee and Dr. Sawyer thanked the presenters for their thoughtful presentation of information on a complex issue, and asked about what other towns are doing.

Mr. Palitsch then opened the Public Hearing. Speakers were: Bob Ryan; SPS students Lucy Rajwani, Declan Daley, and Noelle Daley; Bryan Moss; John Cheniek; and Manish Dosi. Speakers provided their

perspectives on the potential styrofoam ban, both pro and con. Mr. Palitsch thanked the speakers and indicated that the School Committee would discuss the topic at its next meeting on May 16.
