Available Funds

Through the hard work and dedication of many Shrewsbury community members, significant funds were raised for the Shrewsbury Public Schools through this engaging event.

The Celebration in the Garden event raised \$60,000

Distribution of Funds

These funds have been distributed to each school to address specific building needs that were unable to be accommodated in the appropriated budget. The funds were distributed based on a per pupil basis.

Investment of Funds

In recent years, the majority of funds have been devoted to technology purchases for items such as interactive white boards, projectors, document cameras and iPads. There has been a strong, positive response from teachers around the power of recent technology purchases to impact student learning. As we were not able to increase the technology budget as much as we would have liked, the *Celebration in the Garden* funds will be used to increase access to technology and provide innovative opportunities for students.

Introduction

Shrewsbury Public Schools has successfully completed the hiring process to fill key positions within the District. These positions were hired to improve class sizes at all levels, address mandated needs for the Special Education Department, meet the requirements of the Educator Evaluation mandate, replace teachers who resigned or retired, provide coverage for maternity leaves, and to replace a very small number of non-renewals. In some cases internal candidates filled positions, providing growth opportunities for them, and also creating open positions to replace those educators in their previous roles. As of August 29, 2014 we had appointed 110 professional positions, including long-term substitute teachers, and 36 paraprofessional positions were created. Rather, through positions created through the override budget (74.4 positions, including 61.5 professional positions), resignations, retirements, non-renewals, and backfills for educators appointed to new roles, we conducted searches and filled 110 professional positions and 36 paraprofessional positions.

New Hiring-Professional Staff

To date we have appointed 110 full and part time individuals to professional education positions within the district. 98 of these are full year appointments. 81/110 positions were filled by "new to us" finalists:

- 60.5% (49/81) have attained their Master's Degree
- Our Master's Degree finalists received their degrees as follows:
 - Clark University: 5 graduates
 - Worcester State: 4 graduates
 - Assumption College: 4 graduates
 - Other frequently attended Master's degree programs include those at Bridgewater State, Fitchburg State, Framingham State, University of Massachusetts at Amherst or Boston
- All of our professional hires possess a Bachelor's Degree:
 - o 10 received their degree from University of Massachusetts at Amherst
 - 9 received their degree from Assumption College
 - 9 received their degree from Worcester State
 - Other frequently attended Bachelor's degree programs include those at Holy Cross, Westfield State, Bridgewater State, Clark University, Framingham State and Fitchburg State

We have also hired a new Director of Business Services, announced in the spring, and a new Safety, Security and Transportation Coordinator.

As the School Committee is aware, the teacher selection process in Shrewsbury is rigorous, and through the hard work of our District Leadership Team, and the many educators who volunteered to be part of selection committees, we were able to hold to our high standards and expectations despite the heavy volume of hiring.

The process included interviews with principals, department directors, curriculum coordinators/instructional coaches, teachers, parents, and central office administrators. At the middle and high school levels, students also served on the interview teams.

All teaching positions require a demonstration lesson in the classroom, which is a key ingredient in the selection and hiring process. All candidates recommended for hire are also required to interview with the Director of Human Resources and the Superintendent of Schools as the final step in the selection process, where our mission and core values are discussed individually with each finalist. A through reference check is conducted on each new hire, as well as a CORI (Massachusetts criminal background) check. This year, with a new state law in place, new hires have also been required to have their fingerprints digitally recorded and compared to the national FBI criminal database. While the designated centers have experienced backlogs in processing, our educators have either completed this portion of the background check entirely or have scheduled an appointment to do so.

We continued to use www.schoolspring.com as our primary sourcing tool, which netted 5287 applicants to our professional level positions. This means that less than 2.1% of those who applied to our professional positions ultimately received a position with us. These application packets were reviewed by selection committees, principals and directors. Some were selected for phone interviews, and then an even smaller number invited for face to face interviews and their teaching demonstration lessons. References were contacted, which resulted in the finalist recommendations. This exhaustive effort could not have been accomplished without the support of virtually our entire community of educators and our outstanding school leaders.

Our new professional educators completed two days of orientation on August 21 and August 22 and a mentor has been assigned and agreed to assist each one for the entire upcoming year.

New Hiring-Paraprofessional and Support Positions

As of August 29, 2014 we had hired 36 paraprofessional positions. These positions netted **1090** applicants. This means that we hired 3.3% of those who applied to our paraprofessional and support positions. These applicants also underwent a rigorous selection process, which included applicant packet screening, phone and face to face interviews, reference checks, the CORI background check, and the national FBI background check (fingerprints).

Conclusion

At an upcoming school committee meeting the administration will present a complete staffing chart to show the actual staffing levels throughout the district versus the staffing levels that were projected when the "YES" override budget was approved at town meeting in May.

Attached is listing of administrator hires, including employees from within the district who have assumed these roles for the 2014/2015 school year.

In closing, the Shrewsbury Public Schools continues its longstanding excellent reputation as a collaborative and desirable district in which to work.

New Administrators

Robert Dunn, Social Studies Coordinator for Sherwood and Oak Middle Schools Rob Dunn has served the district as an Eighth Grade Social Sciences Teacher since 2003 before assuming this new role. Mr. Dunn holds a Master of Art in Education, with a concentration in History, from Cambridge College. He holds a Bachelor of Arts in Economics from the University of Massachusetts at Amherst. He attained his Teacher Certification in History from Framingham State College, participated in Harvard University's Harvard World Teach Orientation in Kenya, and has graduated from the Commonwealth Leadership Academy Administrative Licensure Program.

Debra Garcia, Director of Physical Education, Health, and Family Consumer Science Ms. Garcia comes to us from Boston Public Schools. She holds a Master of Science in Education, with a focus in Supervision/Administration from the University of Dayton. She holds a Bachelor of Science, Health, and Physical Education K-12 from Virginia Commonwealth University. Besides her career as an educator, she also served for nine years as an NCAA Women's Basketball Official for Divisions I, II, and III.

Moreen Labelle, Director of Special Education, Elementary Schools

Ms. Labelle has joined us from Bay Path Regional Vocational High School, where she was the Director of Special Education. She holds a Master of Special Education from Worcester State University and a Bachelor of Arts in Communication Disorders from Worcester State University. She is a licensed Special Education administrator.

Brian L'Heureux, Director of Information Technology

Brian L'Heureux has served the district as a Data Specialist and then the Information Technology Systems Manager since 2010. He holds a Bachelor of Science in Computer Science from Worcester Polytechnic Institute, and is a proud graduate of Shrewsbury High School.

Melissa McCann, Mathematics Coordinator for Sherwood and Oak Middle Schools Ms. McCann has served the district since 2010 as the Advanced Math Coach at Sherwood Middle School. She holds her C.A.G.S. in Educational Leadership from Bridgewater State University, a Master of Science, with a focus in Math Education, from Central Connecticut State University, and a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology-based Human Resources from Connecticut College.

Thomas O'Toole, Director of Performing Arts

Mr. O'Toole comes to us from Nashoba Regional High School, where he served as both a Music Teacher and as the Music Department Director. He holds a Master of Music in Composition from the University of

Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, a Bachelor of Music in Music Education and Composition from the University of Lowell, and is licensed as a Supervisor/Director of Core Arts, through the Fine Arts Director certificate program at Fitchburg State College. Mr. O'Toole performs regularly with the Metropolitan Wind Symphony.

Shawna Powers, Director of Instructional Technology and Media Services

Ms. Powers has joined us from Sharon Middle School, where she served as a Technology Teacher, and participated in numerous leadership opportunities throughout her district. She holds a Master of Education in Instructional Technology from Bridgewater State University and a Bachelor of Science with a major in Psychology and a minor in Elementary Education from Vassar College. She is certified as a Principal/Assistant Principal through her postgraduate work in Educational Leadership at Bridgewater State University.

Patricia Waterhouse, Director of Special Education, Sherwood Middle School Ms. Waterhouse has been the Director of Specialized Education at Mercy Centre since 1993. She holds a Master of Education, with a focus in Special Education, from Fitchburg State University and a Bachelor of

Arts in Education and Psychology from Mount Holyoke College. She also has completed numerous credits in postgraduate work in the area of Communication Disorders.

Cecelia Wirzbicki, Director of Business Services

Ms. Wirzbicki served Winchendon Public Schools since 1998, where her most recent role was as Assistant Business Manager. She holds her Bachelor of Arts in Psychology from Assumption College and has completed recent coursework towards her Master of Public Finance from Suffolk University. She is certified as a School Business Administrator since 2011 and holds her Certificate in Management and Finance from Suffolk University.

Report to the School Committee: 2014 Summer Programs

Introduction

This year there were over 1,500 registrations into the Shrewsbury Summer Programs. These programs serviced students in the Pre-K through high school levels. The different programs provided students opportunities in the areas of Special Education, Academic Support, Transition, and Enrichment. This report includes information on each of the summer programs that were offered in 2014.

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Shrewsbury Public Schools Parker Road Preschool Special Education Program

Overview:

The Special Education Program at Parker Road is an IEP driven program designed to support students who meet eligibility for Extended Year Services (ESY). The program is intended to support learners from regression of skills.

Number of Students Served: 48

Dates of Program: 6/30/14-8/7/14

Program Funding Source: Special Education Budget

Representative Program Offerings:

The Special Education classroom supports preschool age students in a variety of goal areas three days per week for 2.5 hour per day. The classrooms are designed to mimic a typical preschool session with specially designed instruction to meet the learning needs of each student through small and whole group activities as well as center activities. There are two sessions (morning and afternoon that each service 9-15 students per year). The areas of focus include communication, social behavior, pre-academic, fine & gross motor and adaptive skills. The student's IEP drives the teams service delivery.

Intensive Special Education

The Intensive Special Education classroom supports preschool age students in a variety of goal areas three days per week for six hours per day. The classrooms are designed to mimic a typical preschool session in the mornings and small and individual instruction in the afternoon with specially designed instruction to meet the learning needs of each student. The areas of focus include communication, social behavior, pre-academic, fine & gross motor and adaptive skills. The student's IEP drives the team's service delivery.

The ELC program supports preschool age students in a variety of goal areas four days per week for six hours per day. The students are supported by ABA technicians trained in the applied behavior analysis and discrete trial teaching. The students are taught in varying ratios (1:1, 1:2, 2:3) with specially designed instruction to meet their individual learning needs. The areas of focus include communication, social behavior, pre-academic, fine and gross motor and adaptive skills. The student's IEP drives the team service delivery.

Walk-in speech and language, occupational therapy and physical therapy services are provided to students who require extended year servicess in the area of speech and language and/or fine/gross motor skills. These are typically once or twice per week for 30 minutes depending on the IEP.

Shrewsbury Public Schools Parker Road Summer Enrichment

Overview:

Parker Road Preschool Summer Enrichment 2014 offered three, week long classes July 22nd, 29th and August 5th. These offerings were theme based classes that provided students with the opportunity to lean and socialize with peers in a structured and developmentally appropriate setting.

Number of Students Served: 28

Dates of Program: 7/07/14-8/7/14

Representative Program Offerings:

Example 1:

Art Expo

Children become artists as they create their own masterpieces using a variety of exciting media. Children will learn about and create their own unique artwork using various traditional and non-traditional art mediums such as feathers, marbles, pipe cleaners, kitchen gadgetry, and much more! They will explore basic artistic concepts involving shape, line, color, and space.

Example 2:

Mystery Madness:

In every child, there is a small detective just DYING to come out. Children will learn to use clues to make predictions to solve the mysteries at the Parker Road Preschool Camp. Who in fact stole the cookie from that cookie jar? Was it a mouse?? Come join your fellow detectives to solve these camp capers.

Program Coordinator: Kristin Herrick

Coordinator Reflections:

This year we were able to increase the duration of the camp by 30 minutes and by two weeks. This is was due to the earlier advertisement of the program. Next year we need to consider how to help the program grow to accommodate more students while maintaining its success.

Shrewsbury Public Schools Get a Feel for Beal

Overview:

The program is designed to introduce incoming students to the "day in the life" of a kindergartener.

The program is set-up so children easily transition through the expected routines of a day engaging in whole group, song and play.

The program is introduced on the school website under Kindergarten information and a letter is sent home with all new student registrations.

Number of Students Served: 70

Dates of Program: 8/4/14-8/7/14

Program Funding Source: Tuition

Representative Program Offerings:

The program allows incoming Kindergarten children to experience circle time, snack time, centers, recess and dismissal. The program helps teach the children how to independently transition through the routines of the day.

The program includes a tour of the building. Modeling how to walk in the halls, while letting the children become familiar with the gym, cafeteria, Nurses office, Media, Principal's Office, playground and a visit to their classroom.

Program Coordinator: Lauren Beaudoin

Coordinator Reflections:

One concern expressed was the inclusion of a child with special needs but without specific support. A suggestion would be, if a child with specific needs will be attending the program, there should be notification in advance and the SPED Dept. needs to provide the necessary support for the child in need.

Shrewsbury Public Schools Elementary Summer Special Education Program

Overview:

The Oak Summer Special Education Program provided instruction for students Grades K-3. All services are based on specific information reflected in each student's service delivery page located in his/her Individualized Education Plan (IEP). Students qualify to receive summer services through data collection that demonstrates significant regression after breaks from school and academics.

Number of Students Served: 125

Dates of Program: 6/30/14-8/7/14

Program Funding Source: Special Education budget

Representative Program Offerings:

Academic Program classroom teachers provide remedial instruction in reading, writing, and mathematics in a small group setting. The summer curriculum is designed based on the objectives listed in each child's IEP. The classrooms are developed by similar student needs.

Social Skills Program provides social skills instruction embedded in student interest-based group activities. The objectives of this program are designed based upon student IEPs. Teachers use the social curriculums that the students are working on during the school year to target student-specific objectives. Each classroom has several peer models that are identified by school teams as having exceptional interpersonal skills.

The Early Learning Center Program provides students enrolled in this program during the school year with program continuation during the summer months. Programming is based in the principles of Applied Behavioral Analysis. Instruction is designed based on the individual student needs (academic, social, behavioral, life skills, etc.).

During the Summer Program, students may receive related support services (occupational therapy, physical therapy, speech and language, structured reading). These services are provided for those students who are either attending the summer program or who come for walk-in services in their specific area of need. Each service is provided by a certified professional in the specific field.

Coordinator Reflections:

The Summer Program ran efficiently this summer due to teachers and service providers receiving detailed student summaries related to current levels of performance in academic, behavioral, language, and social skills. The Early Learning Center (ELC) Programs continued their collaborative efforts to train staff and transition students across the summer months. Staff observed and trained with students transitioning from Parker Road Preschool and to Sherwood Middle School. Students in the summer program were well supported due to staffing levels based on Individualized Education Plan (IEP) services. However, it is recommended that school-year educational Teams and Team Chairs continue to consider the smaller summer class size and increased teacher-to-student ratio when making IEP recommendations for staffing.

Shrewsbury Public Schools Elementary Summer Enrichment Program (ESEP)

Overview:

The goal of the Elementary Program (ESEP) is to spark and enhance the imagination and curiosity of children by providing them with interactive, enjoyable and educational programs in a safe environment. Registration is online and takes place in two phases. The first registration is in late February followed by a second round of registrations in April. Parents may also enroll in available classes upon the opening of the ESEP in June.

Number of Students Served: 589

Dates of Program: 6/30/2014-7/24/2014

Program Funding Source: Tuition

Representative Program Offerings:

The Summer Enrichment class, "Beginning Vocal Skills" was directed by Ann Tomashefsky. In class, the students had the opportunity to learn about what it takes to create a strong and proficient vocal using Heritage, Patriotic, Disney and Broadway Show Tunes and Musicals. The children learned proper breathing, projection, diction and voice maintenance. In addition, the students utilized Solfege, American Sign Language, various choreography and props to best demonstrate their skills using a variety of media. The students were happy to perform a "Singer's Showcase" for the other students, teachers and parents on the last day of class.

In "Our Community Heroes" taught by Lynn Pinto, students learned about acts of courage, how our local heroes inspire others and make extraordinary efforts on a daily basis to positively influence and contribute to our community. Students met some of our favorite local heroes including a fireman, policeman, and EMT. They learned about fire/general safety at home and around town, what to do in the event of an emergency, explored the safety vehicles (police car, fire truck and ambulance) and discussed what it takes to be a hero within the community. This class focus was on character education, teamwork, acts of kindness and volunteerism.

Shake, move and have fun were Emily Chaves objectives in "Danceastics". Young children learned a variety of dances including salsa, meringue, hip-hop, and pop. Studies show that dance improves memory, reduces stress, and improves cognitive function. This class provided the perfect opportunity for students to exercise their brains and their bodies. Students had a blast following

along to dance moves and then showing families all the great moves they learned!

Students in "Painting Pals and Color Creations", offered by Michelle Liberty, experimented with different surfaces, techniques and colors. The use of various paints, tie-dyes and markers allowed students to create one of a kind projects. Students experimented with food coloring by combining different colors, predicting the outcome and using different angles to see a variety of light effects. This class gave the students an opportunity to work together as a team by engaging in different group activities, while also allowing each student an opportunity to be creative in their own way.

Reflections

The Elementary Summer Enrichment program went extremely well. The biggest challenge this year was the acclimation of staff and programs to a new location. Despite the transition from Floral Street to the Oak Middle school setting due to the need to paint the interior of Floral Street over the summer, the staff and students adjusted well. Although the middle school setting was a change from previous years, mainly the non age-appropriate setting, the staff demonstrated their professionalism by adapting to the structural environment and made do with what was available to them. All participants (hired staff and volunteers) manged to create successful experiences for the students. Communication to the parents concerning transportation and traffic flow well in advance of the program as well as additional registration dates immediately prior to the start of the program greatly eased the experience for the parents. The SHS students (approximately 150) continued to volunteer to support classroom teachers in instruction and supervision.

Shrewsbury Public Schools Middle School Summer Extensions

Overview:

The Middle School Summer Extensions Program seeks to provide enriching learning experiences and hands on activities for students entering grades five through eight. There is a wide range of courses offered: skill building for sports, visual and performing arts, technology, the humanities, science, math, improving study/organizational habits, and a baby-sitting certification program. Families register students through two online registrations that occur in February and April. Students may also register on site in June and July during program hours for classes that are still open.

Number of Students Served: 267

Dates of Program: 6/30/14 - 7/24/14

Program Funding Source: Tuition

Representative Program Offerings:

Computer Programming: This course teaches 5th through 8th grade students how to code using Python technology. Students in this course learn the basics of coding, develop an understanding of the mechanics behind calculations and variables, examine the process of asking questions with "If" and using "Else" statements, and learn how to use functions and modules to create code loops during program development. Students develop creativity, reasoning, and problem solving skills The culminating project of this class is for students to create their own game called "Bounce", which based on the programming principles learned throughout the week.

Learn to Sing Like a Pro: This course uses guided techniques and activities to help students learn to sing in tune. This course covers all of the basic principles of singing: vocal warm-ups, breathing techniques, projection, stage presence, and dictation. These skills are taught using a variety of song styles such as traditional melodies, broadway shows/musicals, and contemporary literature. This class serves to improve vocal skills, enhance self confidence, and provides students with an outlet for developing their talent while working with a professional vocal coach.

Fashion Design Creations: In this course, students develop their creativity and innovation skills by creating trendy new designs for their old or lackluster clothes. Students inventoried their closets for fashion challenges, developed project plans to create "new" clothes, sourced needed materials for their projects, and learned

the basics of measuring, cutting, pinning, and sewing when designing clothes and home furnishings. Students used a variety of fabric and sewing techniques to repurpose their clothes, embellish their fashion designs, and create room accents.

Extreme Science: In this course, students explore the principles of physics and matter through a variety of engineering and design challenges. Students explored these principles by developing science experiments that included building their own roller coasters, designing parachutes, launching water rockets, and creating their own "volcanic eruptions" through the Diet Coke and Mentos Eruption Challenge. Students worked in groups all week to solve the challenges presented to them, enhancing their critical thinking, communication, and collabotation skills.

Coordinator Reflections:

Given that this was my first year running the program, I was struck by the high level of teaching and learning that was taking place in each of the courses. The level of knowledge, skill, and technique that teachers brought with them each day to engage students in the learning process was truly impressive. The courses, regardless of the content, were collaborative, hands on, innovative, and engaging. Students not only had the opportunity to enrich their understanding of various content, but they were also able to develop their use of "soft skills" in this highly interactive and creative environment. Although each class operated independently, the teachers were also able to foster a sense of community by supporting other classes during special events such as gallery walks, performance presentations, and project displays.

Shrewsbury Public Schools Middle Level Summer Special Education Program

Overview:

The Sherwood Middle School Summer Special Education Program provides instruction for students Grades 5-8. All services are based on specific information reflected in the student's service delivery page located in his/her Individualized Education Plan (IEP). Students qualify to receive services through data collection that demonstrates significant regression during summer months, as well as IEP Team discussions.

Number of Students Served: 73

Dates of Program: 6/31/14-8/7/14

Program Funding Source: Special Education Budget

Representative Program Offerings:

Academic Program: Designed to provide instruction in reading, writing, and mathematics across a small group setting. The summer curriculum reflects IEP-based, student-specific objectives, and is designed to maintain, and prevent the regression of, already-mastered skills. Classroom rosters are tailored to ensure similar student needs and delivery of instruction.

ELC

Educational Learning Center (ELC) Program: Designed to provide ELC students with a continuation of their individualized educational plans. The program utilizes the tenets of Applied Behavioral Analysis as part of its methodology, as well as instruction delivery. The latter is based on the student's IEP-specific needs (academic, behavioral, life skills, etc.).

Related Service Providers: Students who qualify receive related support services (occupational therapy, physical therapy, speech and language, structured reading, etc). These services are provided either during the hours the student attends the summer program, or during previously-scheduled times as "walk-in" services. Service providers are certified professionals in their respective fields.

Shrewsbury Public Schools High School ELC and Essential Summer Programs

Overview:

The 2014 ELC and Essential Summer Programs were designed to address the functional academic, communication, social and behavioral goals specific to each student in the program. Individual and small group activities in reading and math are specifically designed to target skills related to individual IEP goals. Students in both programs also participate in a community component, either Community Based Learning (ELC) or MOVE (Essential). Other support services (Speech, OT, PT) are provided as outlined in the student service delivery grid in the IEP.

Number of Students Served: ELC 12 students/ Essential 10 students

Dates of Program: ELC 6 weeks 6/30/14 - 8/7/14 Essential 4 weeks 6/30/14 - 7/24/14

Program Funding Source: Special Education Budget

Representative Program Offerings:

Summer Reading (ELC): To account for all reading levels, Students listened to a book on tape "Hatchet" focusing on active listening and comprehension. Students then completed associated extension activities including forming teams and building their own shelters out of wood (rolled newspaper), targeting communication and social skills.

Summer Math: The students decided to have a second annual "Lemonade War" Students voted on what the two drinks should be (pink lemonade and iced tea), worked together to determine how much they wanted to sell the lemonade for, how big the cups would be and then how much lemonade needed to be purchased. Students developed an "advertising plan" made posters to hang around the school and a large team posters to hang at the selling stations. Students took turns manning stations at the lemonade stands, filling the cups, collecting the money and recording sales. Money then had to be counted, coins rolled, totals tallied. This year the students raised \$124.40 which was donated to Horizons for Homeless Children.

After reading the book Hatchet, the students watched the movie "Castaway" and compared and contrasted the similariites and differences between the two survivial stories.

Shrewsbury Public Schools Summer R.E.C.E.S.S Reading Program

Overview:

Our goal is to provide a relaxed environment where children can meet, read and discuss their summer reading books with their same age peers, in hopes that they stay engaged and continue reading throughout the summer. In June, a description of the program and a schedule are posted in various locations: Shrewsbury Public Schools web site, Shrewsbury Public Library web site under calendar, notices from the schools, as well as posters in the library. Parents sign up on line and receive a confirmation email. The hour-long classes are held during the month of July in the Shrewsbury Public Library meeting room.

Number of Students Served: 225

Dates of Program: 7/7/14 to the end of the month

Program Funding Source: Curriculum and Instruction Budget

Representative Program Offerings:

The teacher reads the book and discusses certain aspects of the book with the children. For example, fellings of the characters and how they would feel in the same situation.

In the session for "Will I be your friend?" the follow up activity was to create a friendship bracelot, explaining that the beads on the bracelot can represent their friends. Tying the knot in the bracelot at the conclussion of the activity creates a circle-a circle of friendship.

Box Car Children. This book depicts children that were able to survive with the struggles they faced living alone. The book discussion lends itself to problem solving-Could you survive on your own without adult supervision at such a young age? What would life be like living in a box car?

Program Coordinator: Deborah Richard and Barbara Andreano

Coordinator Reflections:

The classes are taught by volunteers who are primarily Shrewsbury Public School employees. This year we had 17 volunteers who graciously donated their time to help promote the love reading in children.

Shrewsbury Public Schools Title I Summer Programs

Overview:

The Summer Reading Delivered Program provided 29 Title I students with leveled texts during the summer. The Title I Summer Program provided 16 Title I students with literacy instruction during an 8-day period. There were 11 Title I students who attended the special education summer school. These students were provided with an additional guided reading lesson during the month of July. Title I students were invited to participate based on reading assessments and teacher recommendations.

Number of Students Served: 16 students in Title I Summer School, 29 students in Summer Reading Deliverd and 11 students in Title I/Special Education summer school.

Dates of Program: Summer 2014

Program Funding Source: Title 1 Grant

Representative Program Offerings:

The structure of the Title I Summer Program was based on a balanced literacy block. Students participated in a morning meeting, an interactive read aloud, guided reading lessons, independent reading and a writing block.

Summer Reading Delivered

Students who participated in the Summer Reading Delivered Program received a packet of self-selected, high interest texts delivered to their home by mail. As a result, students had easy access to appropriate literacy materials.

Title I students who attended the special education summer program were provided with additional guided reading instruction. Students received instruction either individually or in very small groups (2-3 students). This instruction was specifically tailored to meet the students areas of need.

Coordinator Reflections:

Overall, we had another successful program. Informal assessments indicate that participating students maintained their literacy skills. These results are consistent with previous years however we will have concrete data once the fall reading assessments are complete.

Shrewsbury Public Schools English Language Education

Overview:

Title III federal funding extends the opportunity for English Language Learner (ELL) students. ELL students entering grades one and two are invited to attend a 9:00am-12:00pm class that meets three times per week for three weeks. ELL students entering grades one through eight are invited to attend a 9:00am-12:00pm class that meets four times per week for two weeks. Summer English Language Development (ELD) instruction enables ELL students to practice their skills in the four language modalities: speaking, listening, reading, and writing.

E. Return on Investment Study: Report

SPECIFIC STATEMENT OR QUESTION:

Will the School Committee hear a report on the Center for American Progress's recent report on the return on investment provided by public school districts across the nation?

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

1. The Center for American Progress is a public policy think tank based in Washington, D.C. that publishes various reports on public education in America.

2. In July, the Center for American Progress published its second report measuring "return on investment" for public school districts in the U.S. It had previously

published a report on this topic in 2011.

- 3. In the 2011 report, the Shrewsbury Public Schools were among only 2.8% of districts in the nation to receive the report's highest rating in all three categories measured (based on 2008-2009 data); in the 2014 report, Shrewsbury was among only 1.8% of over 7,000 districts rated to receive the report's highest rating in all three categories (2014 report is based on 2010-2011 data).
- 4. In the 2011 report, Shrewsbury was one of only 6 out of 176 districts measured to receive the highest rating in all three categories (top 3.4%). In the 2014 report, Shrewsbury was one of only 4 out of 174 Massachusetts districts measured to receive the highest rating in all three categories (top 2.3%).

5. The report's data for Shrewsbury are included in this packet, and the full report is provided under separate cover.



MINUTES OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE MEETING

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 11, 2014

Present: Dr. B. Dale Magee, Chairperson; Mr. Jason Palitsch, Vice Chairperson; Mr. Erin Canzano, Secretary; Ms. Sandra Fryc, Mr. John Samia, Dr. Joseph Sawyer, Superintendent of the Shrewsbury Public Schools; Ms. Mary Beth Banios, Assistant Superintendent of the Shrewsbury Schools; Mr. Todd Bazydlo, Principal of Shrewsbury High School; Mr. Liam T. Hurley, Director of Business Services

The meeting was convened at 7:00 PM by Dr. B. Dale Magee

I. Public Participation

Three members of the community requested to speak during the public participation portion of the School Committee (SC) Board meeting. Dr. Magee encouraged everyone in the audience to be respectful and to provide a quiet atmosphere for people to make comments.

-Ms. Kate Mack said she was at the SC meeting to explain to the community why she thinks it would be a mistake to adopt the PARCC test. She stated that if the PARCC test is adopted as an assessment tool than the school district will be locked into the technology guidelines. Ms. Mack said this will remove all local control of technology and the school district will have to pay more to update technology. Ms. Mack discussed the companies she believes will profit as a result of the implementation of PARCC testing. She said that school districts in Massachusetts that have decided to delay PARCC testing include the Reading and Cambridge school districts. Ms. Mack encouraged the Shrewsbury to delay PARCC testing as well.

-Ms. Kristen Herard spoke and said that she believes Mitchell Chester, Commissioner for the MA Board of Education and Chairman of PARCC Inc. has a conflict of interest regarding the state of Massachusetts and the adoption of PARCC testing. Ms. Herard said that if PARCC is such a great test than why is it necessary to spend an upwards of \$4 million dollars on public relations and marketing to promote the use of the test. She also stated that Ms. Mary Beth Banios, Assistant Superintendent of the Shrewsbury Public Schools, receives a stipend from PARCC and insinuated that this represented a conflict of interest and therefore Ms. Banios should not be making recommendations regarding whether the Shrewsbury Public Schools should use PARCC.

With Dr. Magee's permission to speak, Dr. Sawyer asked Ms. Heard if she had ever contacted Ms. Banios to ask her about her involvement with PARCC before making a public accusation regarding Ms. Banios's involvement with PARCC. Ms. Herard said she had not contacted Ms. Banios. Dr. Sawyer said that Ms. Banios' participation with PARCC would be addressed later that evening in the PARCC Testing Program presentation at the SC meeting.

-Cristina Heffernan said she is a parent in Shrewsbury and has been a math educator of many years. She stated that it is her opinion that the math common core state standards are much better than what existed previously. Ms. Heffernan said that it is important to understand that this is a state education issue and not federal. She shared some reasons about why she is excited about the common core standards for math education.

III. Superintendent's Report

- -Dr. Sawyer congratulated the Oak Middle School students who participated in putting on the production of the Pajama Game. He said this musical was a high school level production.
- -Dr. Sawyer congratulated the SHS boys lacrosse team for winning the district championship for the first time and said the team had a tough loss in the state semifinals.
- -Dr. Sawyer congratulated the SHS girls tennis team for their great performance and for being the state runner-up team. He shared that SHS student Jessica Perkins will be competing in the state single women's tennis championship at St. John's High School this coming weekend.
- -Dr. Sawyer congratulated all the athletes at SHS on their accomplishments.

IV. Time Scheduled Appointments

A. National & State Championships Recognition

- -School Committee members and Dr. Sawyer congratulated SHS sophomore Ms. Julia Ford on winning the individual MIAA Division 1 State Golf Championship in girls' golf. Ms. Ford and Mr. Jason Costa, Director of Athletics at SHS, gave a brief presentation discussing her performance. In the fall, Ms. Ford is a member of the SHS boys' golf team (SHS does not have a girls golf team), and in the spring she competes in the girls' tournament. She thanked Mr. Costa for driving her to the golf tournaments to compete. Dr. Sawyer stated that in addition to being a great athlete. Ms. Ford is also a very good student and has excelled as a student-athlete.
- -SC members and Dr. Sawyer congratulated Nic Gerard on willing the national championship in Congressional Debate. In May, the SHS Speech and Debate team traveled to Chicago to compete in the 63rd Annual Grand National Tournament of the National Catholic Forensic League. Nic Gerard, Mr. Todd Byzydlo, SHS Principal, and Marc Rischitelli, SHS Speech and Debate Team Coach discussed Nic's accomplishments and the great performance of the SHS Speech and Debate Team. Mr. Bazydlo congratulated Mr. Rischitelli and the team on a terrific job. He said that this is the second year in a row that SHS has had a student who is a national award winner in speech and debate. Mr. Bazydlo said that SHS placed in the top five out of five-thousand schools at the Speech and Debate Tournament. Mr. Gerard thanked those that have supported him and the SHS Speech and Debate team and said he believes it is really important for the community in Shrewsbury to support the program. Dr. Sawyer discussed the parent group POISE that has raised funds to support the program. He said that he and Mr. Bazydlo will do their best in the future to support SHS Speech and Debate because it is a gem of a program. Mr. Gerard shared that he will be attending Arizona State University in the fall and will be majoring in global studies and possibly communications.

B. School Wellness Advisory Council: Annual Report

Dr. Sawyer presented the report prepared by Ms. Pat Degon, Chairperson of the School Wellness Advisory Committee. He said that Massachusetts requires that every public school district have a School Wellness advisory Committee. Dr. Sawyer said Ms. Degon took on the role for him representing this committee. He shared information from the report including the three priorities that match the district's strategic priorities. Highlights included working to promote healthy habits among students and staff by limiting sugary drinks, reducing screen time, and being active for at least one hour a day. Dr. Magee stated that the federal *Get Fit Adventure* Physical Education Program grant was a center of the wellness initiatives over the last few years. He said this was a good infusion of money for physical education programs. Dr. Sawyer shared the recommendations to include in the Annual Improvement Plan for 2014-

2015: health promotion for self, staff development and parenting strategies. Dr. Sawyer said that Ms. Degon did a strong job in her leadership role on the committee.

V. Curriculum

A. PARCC Testing Program: Presentation, Discussion & Vote

Ms. Banios, Assistant Superintendent of Schools, said she felt she needed to comment on the allegations that came up during the public participation part of the School Committee meeting. Ms. Banios shared details about her role as a PARCC Fellow and said that her participation as a member of this Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education committee has been very public. She spoke about her role communicating with educators about PARCC and the Common Core State Standards, discussing instructional strategies that can be helpful and preparing webinars. Ms. Banios said that she receives a \$2,500 honorarium for time, presentation preparation and travel. She said that she believes her work with PARCC has been helpful to the Shrewsbury district and fellow educators. Ms. Banios said the recommendation that will be made this evening that the district choose PARCC for the coming year is not her personal recommendation but it is a collaborative effort.

Dr. Sawyer reminded the School Committee that in 2011 they voted that one of the district's strategic priorities was "to prepare students for the next generation of assessments." He said that when the opportunity came up he recommended Ms. Banios to be chosen as a PARCC fellow to represent Shrewsbury at the state and national level. Dr. Sawyer said that Shrewsbury has always been a district that wants to have someone at the table when policy is being discussed and when something significant is changing in the educational landscape. Dr. Sawyer said the information and expertise that Ms. Banios has brought back to the district is very informative and that he has absolutely the highest degree of confidence in her integrity.

Ms. Banios gave a detailed presentation including information on the 2-Year PARCC "Test Drive", PARCC Field Test Update and Preliminary Student and Teacher Survey Data and the PARCC/MCAS choice. Ms. Banios said that the Shrewsbury district needed to make a decision about whether to use the PARCC assessment this coming year. She said the final decision about whether to adopt the PARCC test for following years will be made through the Massachusetts State Board of Elementary and Secondary Education. She said the recommendation is being made that the Shrewsbury district participate in the PARCC testing for the 2014-2015 school year in grades 3-8 and not at the high school level. Ms. Banios said it appears the majority of districts are going with PARCC for the coming year. She said there is a level of concern about putting Shrewsbury students at a disadvantage if we do not have the experience and data from students' PARCC assessments in the coming year and then the MA State Board of Education adopts the PARCC assessment for the following year. School Committee Members asked questions and shared input regarding the PARCC and MCAS state testing. Dr. Sawyer said that it is our professional judgment that using the PARCC test for the coming year is the right thing to do and follows the School Committee's strategic priorities. He said his recommendation to the SC is to use the PARCC assessment for the 2014-2015 school year. Dr. Sawyer said he suggests getting feedback from the community and having the School Committee vote prior to the deadline of June 30, 2014.

VI. Policy

A. Organizational Chart - Technology Administration: Presentation & Vote

Dr. Sawyer said he announced last week that Mr. Jon Green had accepted a position with the Westborough district and would be leaving the Shrewsbury School district. He said the district administration has reviewed the position and recommends that the district return the position of Director

of Instructional Technology and Media Services to a PreK-12 Director level. In addition, it is recommended that the current position of Information Technology Systems Manager be changed to Director of Information Technology and report directly to the superintendent. Dr. Sawyer said the administration believes the portfolio of responsibilities for the Director of Technology has become too large for any one position and has recommended the changes with job descriptions and the organizational charts. Dr. Magee requested a motion to vote to revise the district's organizational chart to replace "Director of Technology" with "Director of Information Technology" and to reflect title updates as indicated in the enclosed document. On a motion by Mr. Jason Palitsch, seconded by Ms. Sandra Fryc, the School Committee voted unanimously to revise the district's organizational chart to replace "Director of Technology" with "Director of Information Technology" and to reflect title updates as indicated in the enclosed document

VII. Budget

A. Non-Represented Administrator Compensation: Presentation & Vote

Dr. Sawyer stated that he wanted to remind the School Committee that the only employee group that did not receive any form of additional compensation is the non-represented administrators (i.e. Central Office administrators and principals). He said that he indicated to this group that if the district was on solid footing close to the end of the fiscal year, he would ask the School Committee if something can be done about this freeze. Dr. Sawyer asked the School Committee to vote to authorize a compensation adjustment for non-represented administrators who are returning in Fiscal Year 2015 with a 1% salary adjustment effective with the last pay period of FY 2014. He said this reflects the same cost-of-living adjustment provided to top-step teachers and the total impact of this total would be a little over \$13,000, and that there are more than sufficient resources in the FY 2014 budget to cover this adjustment.

Dr. Magee asked SC members if there were any questions. SC members stated that they support this recommendation and it is important to retain talent and hard-working employees. Dr. Magee requested a motion to vote to authorize a 1% salary adjustment for non-represented administrators who are returning in FY 2015 that would be effective with the last pay period of FY 2014. On a motion by Mr. Jason Palitsch, seconded by Ms. Sandra Fryc, the School Committee voted unanimously to authorize a 1% salary adjustment for non-represented administrators who are returning in FY 2015 that would be effective with the last pay period of FY 2014. Dr. Sawyer told the SC members that he wanted to be sure it was understood that he was included in the group of non-represented administrators to receive the adjustment and if they did not want to include him then he would need to be excluded from the vote. Dr. Magee asked SC members if there was a motion to reconsider the vote that was just passed and there was not a motion.

B. Fiscal Year 2014 Budget Transfers: Vote

Mr. Liam T. Hurley, Director of Business Services, presented budget information and stated that transfers between accounts are required to reconcile the FY14 budget based on actual expenditures. He said that the district will land on budget this year and be in great shape for next year. Mr. Hurley said he is leaving the Shrewsbury district next Friday. He is confident the district is in good shape and will come back and help if necessary. Dr. Sawyer and School Committee committee members congratulated Mr. Hurley on his new position and thanked him for the great work he has done for the Shrewsbury school district, particularly during some very challenging financial times. Dr. Magee requested a motion to vote to authorize the administration to make budget transfers between categories in order to reconcile the FY14 budget. On a motion by Mr. John Samia, seconded by Mr. Jason Palitsch, the School Committee voted unanimously to authorize the administration to make budget transfers between categories in order to reconcile the FY14 budget.

The meeting was convened at 7:00 PM by Dr. B. Dale Magee

I. Public Participation

Dr. B. Dale Magee shared that Mr. Elliot Scott has asked to speak at the School Committee meeting this evening. Mr. Elliot expressed thanks for the opportunity to speak at the meeting. He said he has spoken in the past about the common core education standards and encouraged the School Committee members to continue using the MCAS testing assessment. Mr. Scott shared information about other school districts throughout the United States dropping the PARCC assessment and supporting the MCAS assessment. He spoke about the conflict of interest that exists in Massachusetts and mentioned Mitchell Chester's positions as the Massachusetts Commissioner of Elementary and Secondary Education and the Chairman of the governing board for of Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC). Mr. Elliot said the Shrewsbury district cannot be forced to move to use the PARCC assessment; cannot consider there is a fair assessment taking place between these two interests because of conflicts of interests; and cannot be compelled by the state of Massachusetts to move to the PARCC assessment. Dr. Magee thanked Mr. Elliot for coming to the School Committee meeting to speak and express his opinions.

II. Chairperson's Report and Members' Reports

III. Superintendent's Report

Dr. Sawyer congratulated the SHS boys lacrosse team who were the district champions for the first time in history and then competed in the state semi-finals. He congratulated the SHS girls tennis team who were the district champions and made it to the state finals. Dr. Sawyer congratulated Jessica Perkins, captain of the girls tennis team, who competed in the state finals. He said Ms. Perkins lost to another outstanding player and demonstrated great sportsmanship. Dr. Sawyer congratulated all the Shrewsbury students who will be finishing the school year tomorrow. He congratulated the teachers and staff members for doing a great job during a challenging year with a lack of resources.

Dr. Sawyer recognized Danielle Murray, Director of the Extended School Care Program, who is leaving the district to move on and make a career change. He said Ms. Murray has been with the district for many years and has done an outstanding job directing the Extended School Care Program.

IV. Time Scheduled Appointments

A. Shrewsbury Montessori School: Presentation Regarding Request for Oak Street Property Use Margie Smetana, Director of the Shrewsbury Montessori School, presented with an architect and planner regarding the Shrewsbury Montessori School's plans for expansion and their interest in purchasing a parcel of land located on the Oak Middle School Property. Ms. Smetana shared that they have been working with the Shrewsbury Town Planner, Shrewsbury Selectmen and have had positive and favorable discussions with the Principal of Oak Middle School regarding this proposed project. School Committee members asked questions about traffic flow near the Schools, the potential building site, current numbers of students at the Shrewsbury Montessori School and projections for student population growth. Dr. Sawyer stated that the Shrewsbury district and Oak Middle School have had a long and productive relationship with the Shrewsbury Montessori School. He said that any sale of town land goes through the Town of Shrewsbury Selectmen and said he will be communicating with Mr. Morgado to learn about the next steps in the process. Dr. Sawyer said that he has not formal recommendation at this time due to the many issues involved, although his initial assessment of the potential sale of the land to the Shrewsbury Montessori School is favorable regarding the fact that the strip of land does not serve a useful purpose for Oak Middle School. He also stated that he appreciates the Shrewsbury Montessori School Board coming to present at the School Committee meeting and sharing information.

B. Evaluation of the Superintendent

Ms. Sandra Fryc discussed the process, categories and details for the performance goals and grading for the annual evaluation of the Superintendent. She said that Dr. Sawyer's overall rating is exemplary for the 20013-2014 academic year and that he received the highest performance rating. Ms. Fryc shared some comments from those who provided input for the evaluation. She said the School Committee would like to convey that the district is very fortunate to have Dr. Sawyer's leadership and he has done an excellent job in his position during a very challenging period for the Shrewsbury School district.

Dr. Magee requested a motion to vote to approve the annual evaluation of the Superintendent of Schools. On a motion by Mr. John Samia, seconded by Mr. Jason Palitsch, the School Committee voted unanimously to approve the annual evaluation of the Superintendent of Schools.

Dr. Sawyer asked Dr. Magee if he could speak for a moment. Dr. Sawyer thanked the School Committee for their kind words and appreciated the detailed feedback. He spoke about the great opportunity to work and live in Shrewsbury. Dr. Sawyer thanked his staff members, Shrewsbury educators, colleagues, the Shrewsbury parent community and his family for hard work, team effort and terrific support.

V. Curriculum

A. PARCC Testing Program: Vote

Dr. Sawyer discussed the situation with the potential shift to be made since the Massachusetts school districts have been given the option by the State Board of Education to use either the MCAS or the PARCC testing assessment for the 2014-2015 school year. He said he wanted to make it clear that this is a local choice for one year only. Dr. Sawyer said it appears that about 50% of the districts in the state will go with PARCC testing and the rest will stay with the MCAS assessment for the 2014-2015 school year. The recommendation for the Shrewsbury district is to move to the PARCC testing for grades 3-8 for the 2014-2015 school year. Dr. Sawyer said the intent of the administration has been to provide the School Committee with a balanced set of information for both points of view regarding moving to PARCC testing or staying with MCAS testing for the 2014-2015 school year. Ms. Mary Beth Banios, Assistant Superintendent of Schools, presented a report to the School Committee on the two options for state assessment for the 2014-2015 school year at the June 11, 2014 School Committee Meeting. Ms. Banios

spoke again at the June 18, 2014 School Committee meeting. She shared information about current learning and educational shifts that are taking place with the Shrewsbury mathematics and language arts programs. Ms. Banios discussed the specific recommendation for the Shrewsbury district for moving to the PARCC assessment for the 2014-2015. She said the recommendation of the Shrewsbury School district leadership team is that we do go ahead and use PARCC as the assessment tool for grades 3-8 for the upcoming school year. Ms. Banios said the rationale for this recommendation is that it allows us to interact with this next generation of assessment in a hold-harmless setting, provides initial feedback on our students' performance, provides students with the opportunity to practice with online assessments. and puts the Shrewsbury students on a level playing field if the PARCC assessment is adopted by the MA State Board of Education. Ms. Banios said she thinks that PARCC will be a better assessment regarding the kinds of skills and knowledge the district is teaching students. School Committee members asked questions about how Shrewsbury students did on the pilot tests and Ms. Banios shared information about the positives and challenges of using a new assessment tool. School Committee members stated that they support the recommendation of the Shrewsbury School leadership team to move to the PARCC assessment for the 2014-2015 school, they have reviewed this issue in-depth and believe this decision is the best choice for the benefit of the Shrewsbury students.

Dr. Magee requested a motion to vote to use the PARCC testing program for grades 3-8 for the 2014-2015 school year. On a motion by Ms. Fryc, seconded by Mr. John Samia, the School Committee voted unanimously to use the PARCC testing program for grades 3-8 for the 2014-2015 school year.

A. Coordinator of Development & Volunteer Activity Stipend: Discussion & Vote

Dr. Sawyer shared a brief history of how the position was created within the Shrewsbury School district and highlighted the great accomplishments of Beth McCollum, the individual who was most recently in the role. He said the district has conducted a replacement search and two candidates have emerged. The recommendation is to hire both candidates by creating two positions with one for grades PK-6 and one for grades 7-12. Dr. Sawyer said he believes this would double the capacity of this position and allow the district to better develop the opportunity to begin capital campaign work, strategically pursue sponsorships, etc. He said the district has changed the job description and title of the position. Dr. Sawyer said that his recommendation and request is that the School Committee authorize the administration to allocate up to a maximum of \$30,000 to fund two stipends of \$15,000 each to be used to hire a Coordinator of Development & Volunteer Activity for grades PreK-6 and a Coordinator of Development & Volunteer Activity for grades PreK-6 and a Coordinator of Development funds that are donated and available for that purpose.

On a motion by Mr. John Samia, seconded by Mr. Jason Palitsch, the School Committee voted unanimously to authorize the administration to allocate up to a maximum of \$30,000 to fund two stipends of \$15,000 each to be used to hire a Coordinator of Development & Volunteer Activity for grades PreK-6 and a Coordinator of Development & Volunteer Activity for grades 7-12 with the stipulation that district funds only be used as necessary to supplement funds that are donated and available for that purpose.

Those ideas presented were: return to the Strategic Priorities to assess their effectiveness, begin a 5 year fiscal projection and trends as it relates to budget, continue with Policy, and start the process of negotiations with the Shrewsbury Paraprofessional Assocation.

II. Other Business

Dr. Sawyer and Ms. Malone updated the committee on the status of the new hires in the district. Also Dr. Sawyer informed the committee about current staff who were promoted into new positions. The process was rigorous and complex, but nearly all new hires were in place, and the opening of the new school year was looking to be very successful.
