## Summer Learning 2017

Over 1,500 students participated in summer learning experiences with the Shrewsbury Public Schools this year. These programs served students in grades PreK-8 and provided students opportunities in the areas of reading support, English language education, enrichment, and kindergarten transition.





# Providing Value to the Community

- Programs support the district's strategic priorities
- Extending instruction through the summer helps students maintain skills and prevent regression
- Outreach to new families gives students the opportunity to make school connections prior to September
- Fun and engaging programs strengthen positive feelings about school

## Kindergarten Transition

### "A week in the life of a kindergartener"

- Programs at Beal, Coolidge, Paton and Spring
- 2 ½ hours per day, Mon–Thurs
- Cost to parents\$100

### Benefit to students

- Gain familiarity with building
- Learn classroom routines
- Enter school feeling more confident and ready to learn

## English Language Education

- Funded by Title III grants
- •Programs at Beal and Coolidge for students in grades 1-8
- •Immersive English environment
- •Engaging activities incorporate reading, writing, listening and speaking in a relaxed environment

## Title I Reading

Grant-Funded literacy instruction for eligible students, based on reading assessments and teacher recommendations

**Summer Reading Delivered** 

Participants received a packet of selfselected, high interest texts delivered to their home by mail. As a result, students had easy access to appropriate literacy materials. 88% of participants maintained or increased their literacy skills over the summer




- Free classes, taught by volunteers

## Registration trends



### 2017 enrichment registrations:

Elementary = 2806 (40% increase since 2012) Middle School = 1032 (75% increase since 2012)

# Enrichment What's new in 2017?

- •60 new classes added to the catalogs
- •Increase in the number of STEM classes offered
- •Social skills classes offered to all students in collaboration with the special education department
- •The improved registration form filtered classes according to student's grade, making it easier for parents to choose suitable classes and avoiding placement errors
- •Schedule confirmations were mailed in June, which eliminated much of the typical "Monday morning confusion"
- •Parent surveys were sent at the end of every week rather than the end of the summer, providing us with more timely feedback

## Talented Teachers

- Approximately 125 SPS employees taught in one or more programs
- 285 enrichment classes were offered (189 unique courses)

High School volunteers provided over 5000 hours of service

"My son said they had nice high school volunteers and "things would be so different without the high school volunteers." The positive role models are a bonus, and the ability for younger students to envision themselves coming back to volunteer".

## Challenges

- •Crowded space and high volume traffic at Floral. At our peak, there were 430 enrichment students in the building, most arriving in cars.
- •Identifying and providing appropriate support for special education students participating in enrichment
- •Classes were cancelled in March and April due to low registration yet when families tried to register in June, classes were full. We need to find a balance between early commitments to teachers and flexible enrollment for families.
- •Parent feedback frequently mentions the desire for 5-day programming, additional classes in August, and program hours more conducive to working families
- •Many families questioned the necessity of the \$10/per class registration fee.

## Robotics and Coding








- 15 coding classes were offered


